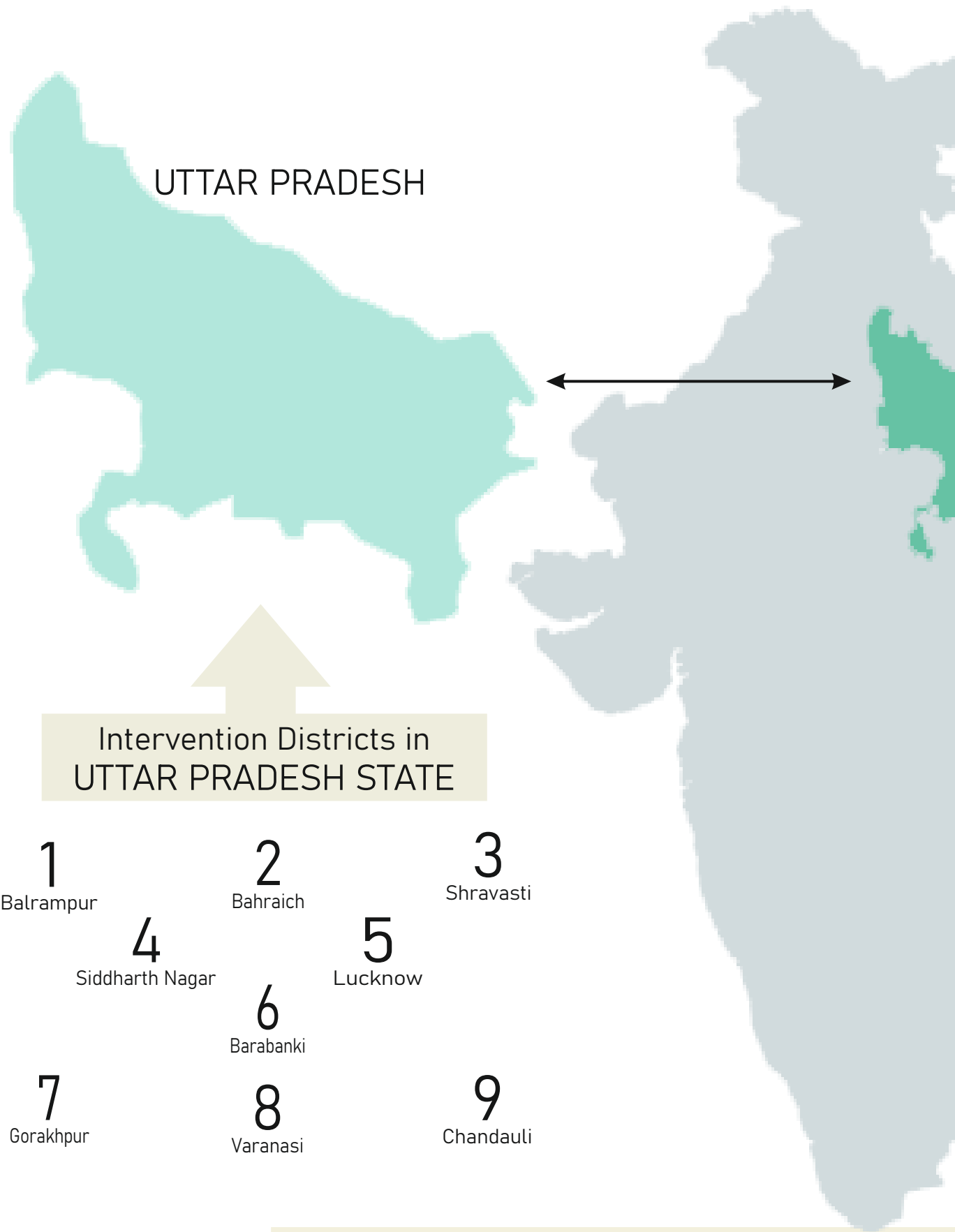

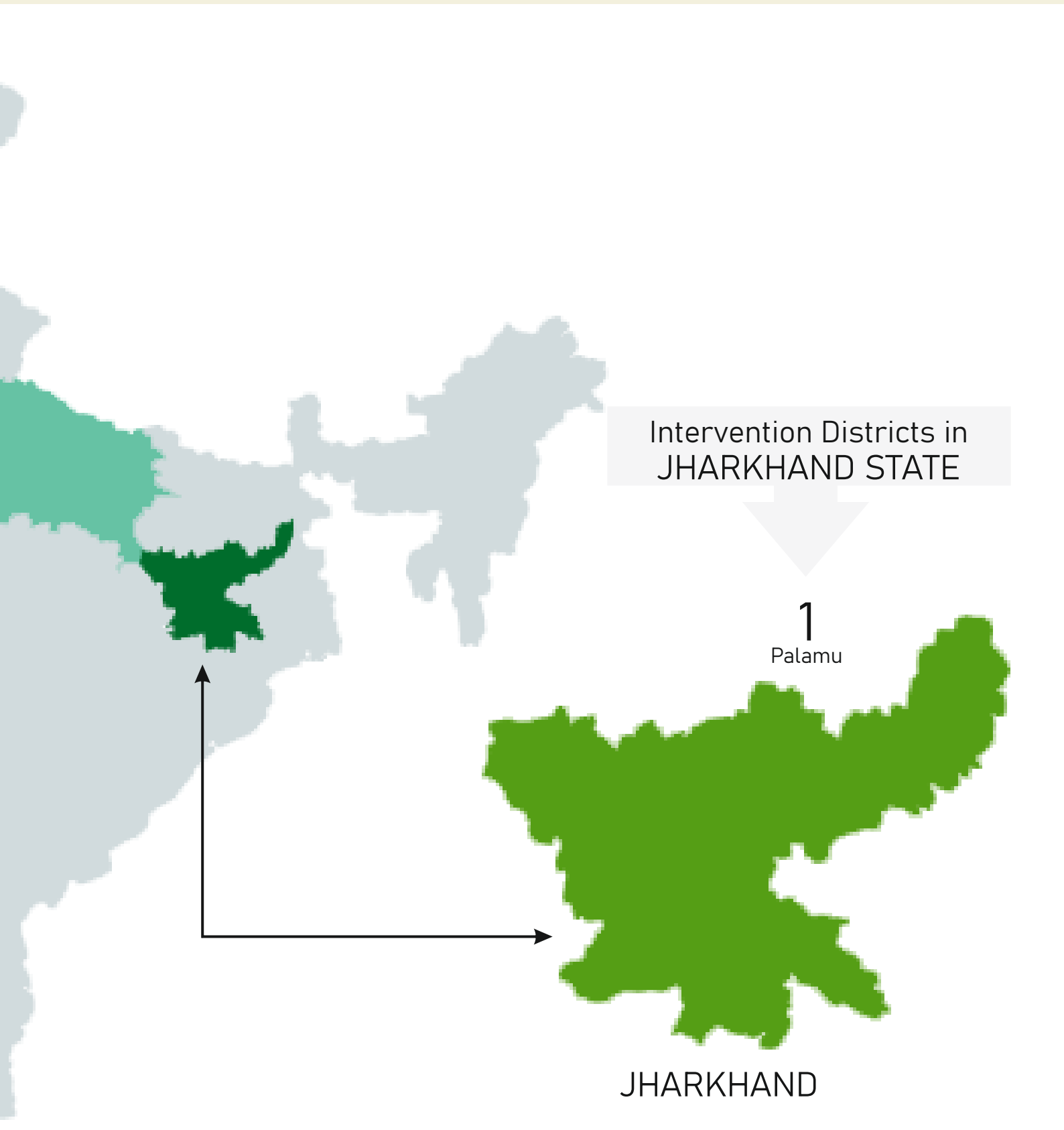

# SSK Geographical Coverage (FY 2022-23)

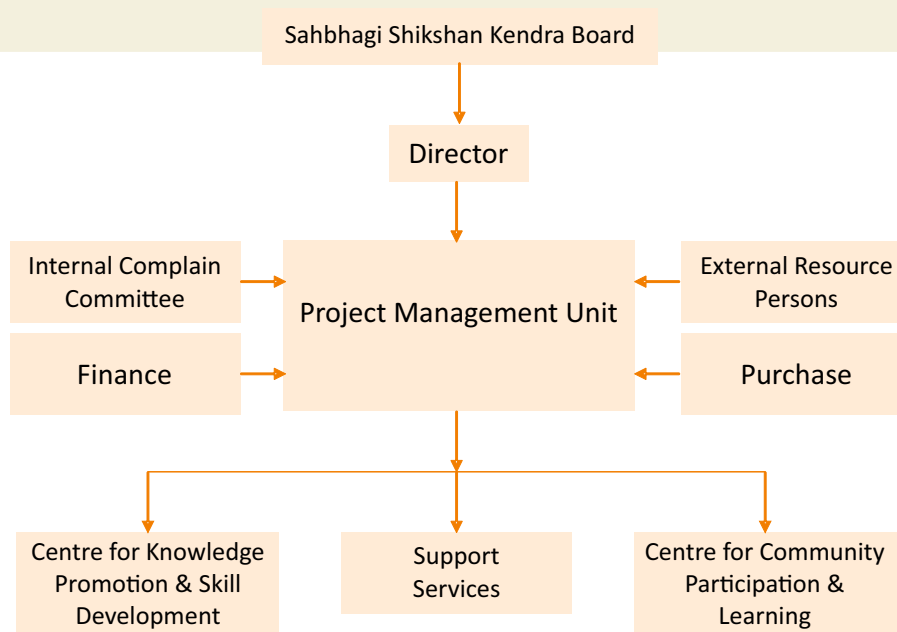

# Governance and Management



## The Director

The Director is authorized to manage the organization with support from the board. Under the Director, there are two Committees at the organizational level. The Program Management Unit, which provides guidance and support to all the projects, and the Gender Committee, which looks into gender related issues. For program implementation, there are two centers, CCPL (Centre for Community Participation and Learning), which is responsible for field level interventions, and CKPSD (Centre for Knowledge Promotion and Skill Development), whose function is skill development and knowledge promotion on various developmental issues. To manage all the work at the organizational level there is an administrative unit including of HR and the Finance department.

## Internal Management System of SSK

SSK's committee is a group of people who take on the responsibility of managing the affairs of the organization that are too complicated to be handled by the larger group to which they belong. It is to manage the regular ongoing issues of the organization. The committee functions effectively and regular meetings are also held to discuss the issues.

Following are the committees existing in the organization:

### 1. Project Management Unit (PMU)

The committee is responsible for the overall management of the all the projects being implemented by Sahbhagi Shikshan Kendra in different intervention area.

## 2. Financial Management Committee

The committee is held responsible for the finance and accounts related work as budget allocation, salary of the human resource and procurement regarding the project requirement.

## 3. CASH Committee (Internal complaint committee against sexual harassment at workplace)

There are six members in the committee who are responsible for gender sensitive work attitude. It is to make field visits and ensure the implementation of gender policies. They will organize Gender sensitive training program for the human resource to safe guard the interest of the staff members and treat them with respect and dignity.

## 4. Purchase Committee

The committee is responsible for fulfilling the material requirement of the organization. The requirement is sent by field staff after which market survey is conducted. The quotations are analyzed by doing comparative bid analysis. In the follow up the best quality product is purchased to use in the organization.

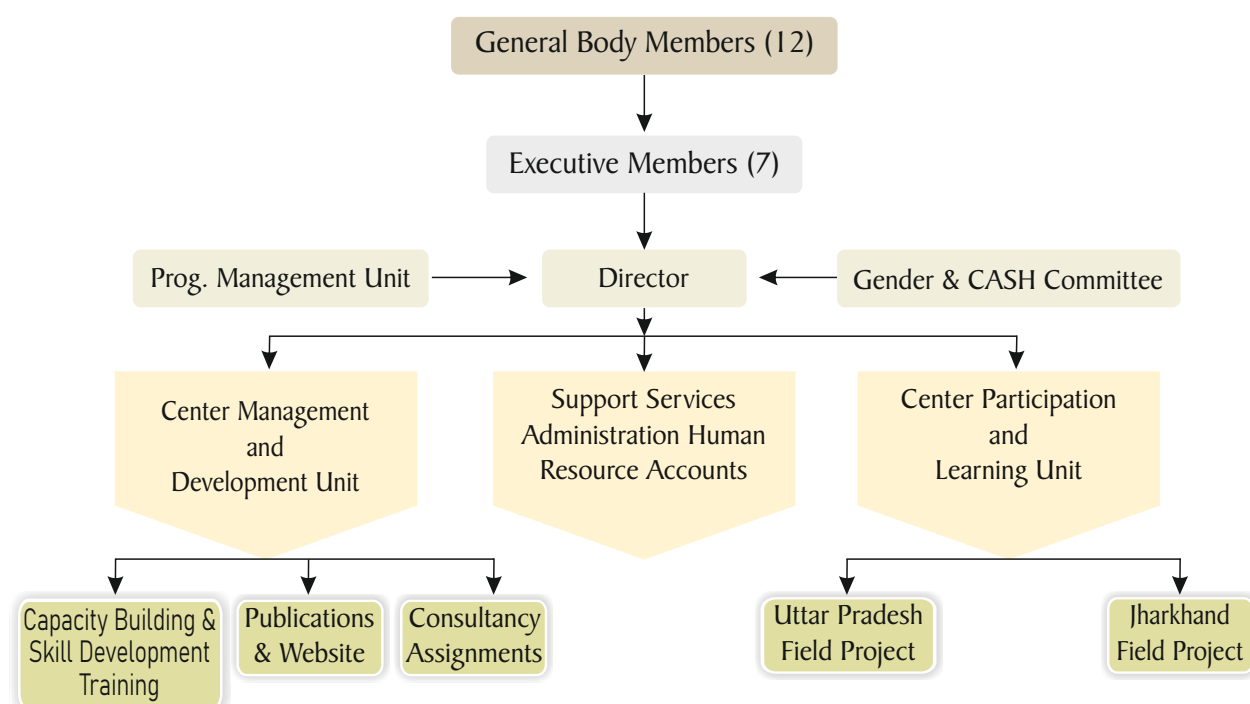
# Our Leadership : Governance of SSK

## Functions of the Executive Body

- ❖ Governance system.

- ❖ Financial management and strategic support for financial control.
- ❖ Developing organizational strategy and review of performance.
- ❖ Appointment of auditors, approval of audited financial statements and ensuring organization's compliance with laws and regulations.

- ❖ To carry out all the mentioned Functions, a minimum of two meetings are held in a year. Overall program direction.

## बाल मन की अभिलाषा : सपनों को मिले पंख

“माँ क्या मैं अब जीवनभर एक पैर एवं डंडे के सहारे ही चलूंगी?” बच्ची के इस प्रश्न ने थोड़ी देर के लिए मां को निरुत्तर कर दिया और सोचने को विवश भी हो गयी। यह घटना सन 2010 की है जब लक्ष्मी अपनी बड़ी बहन के साथ साइकिल से सरकारी स्कूल से वापस आ रही थी। इसी दौरान सड़क दुर्घटना में उसका बायां पैर बुरी तरह से जख्मी हो गया। लक्ष्मी को तत्काल किसी अच्छे अस्पताल में इलाज की जरूरत थी लेकिन पैसे के अभाव में स्थानीय स्तर पर मरहम पट्टी कर फिर उसे मेडिकल कालेज लखनऊ के लिए रेफर कर दिया गया। मेडिकल कालेज के डॉक्टरों ने भी अपनी सामर्थ्य के हिसाब से लक्ष्मी का इलाज कर उसे डिस्चार्ज कर दिया।

13 साल के लम्बे सफर के बाद 04 जुलाई को लक्ष्मी को एक नया जीवन मिल गया। वह अपने दोनों पैरों पर प्राकृतिक रूप से चल रही है और अत्यधिक खुश है शायद उसे भी विश्वास नहीं होगा कि उसके जीवन में यह दिन भी आयेगा। उसको अपने आगे के सपनों को साकार करने के लिए मानों पंख मिल गये हैं।

“Mother, will I walk with the help of one leg and a stick for the rest of my life?” told Laxmi.

This question has left her mother speechless for some time and she was forced to ponder upon her future.

Back in 2010, Lakshmi along with her elder sister went to School on a bicycle and a major accident badly damaged her left leg.

Lakshmi required immediate treatment in a good hospital but due to a lack of financial resources, she was bandaged in a local Hospital and then referred to the Medical College, Lucknow.

There too she could not get proper treatment however the doctors of the medical college have treated her according to their best capacity.

After a long and challenging journey of 13 years, with SSK support Lakshmi got a new life by getting an artificial leg on 4th July. Now she is able to walk naturally on her both legs and is extremely glad. She too would not believe herself that this day would ever come in her life. It felt as if she had wings to fly.



# Centre for Community Participation and Learning (CCPL)

This center manages direct field level interventions at different locations (experimentation sites) on various developmental issues. The idea behind it is to develop an understanding on particular issues and consolidate learnings and experiences in order to share it with other CSOs and stakeholders and initiate a process of advocacy with the Government for a systemic change.

10 Villages, Hussainabad Block, Palamu, Jharkhand

## Towards a positive change

Say it is locational disadvantage or that development couldn't catch sight of this place, Hussainabad block has been a neglected region since years. Infamous for being naxal infested, this region is isolated and deprived of many basic amenities. Proper roads are still a dream to the inhabitants. It houses many backward communities such as Musahar and Bhuiya caste groups, who are socio-economically vulnerable and are the victims of the caste hatred in the villages. Illiteracy, exploitative practices at different levels, moneylenders and employers/contractors in these regions further degrade the socio-economic condition. There is a dearth of employment opportunities in the region, due to which people periodically migrate to other regions in search of work, some stay back while others remain unemployed and poor, intergenerationally.

# Holistic Rural Development Program (HRDP)



10 Villages, Niyamtabad Block, Chandauli, Uttar Pradesh

## A change that speaks for itself

Despite lying by the Ganga basin and close to major important cities, Niyamtabad block of Chandauli district has a huge population who live in dire poverty. The farmers, trapped in the cycle of mono cropping, suffer a major challenge to irrigate farmland during summers. Shrinking size of landholdings, rapid urbanization, absence of knowledge and innovation, little prospects of alternative income pose further threat to their sustenance. ## Developing Demonstrative Model of Localizing SDGs in Gram Panchayats in Aspirational Districts of U.P.

The SDGs localization is translating the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development into local actions and impacts that contribute to the global achievement of the SDGs. The Government of Uttar Pradesh has decided to do it in a phased manner at the Gram Panchayat level, accordingly in the first phase, three themes -child friendly village, clean and green village and women friendly village have been identified to achieve the sustainable goals at the gram panchayat level.

UNICEF Field Office for Uttar Pradesh entrusted Sahbhagi Shikshan Kendra to demonstrate model of LSDG focusing Child Friendly Gram Panchayat. ### Clean, green and safe school

Major finding through eco-club : children's participatory Activity (out of 15 school from Lucknow and Bahraich)

- 90% of the school not have electricity facilities in their toilets.
- No provision of dustbin in specially girls toilets in almost all schools.
- 60% of schools do not have any provision for cleaning toilets on regular basis.
- 60% of schools do not have ramp facility for disabled children, whereas every school has specially abled children enrolled.
- No provision for emergency menstrual kit for girls student.
- Only 20% schools have earthquake resistant building.

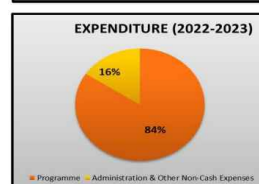

गांवों की उन्नति के लिए सार्वजनिक स्थानों पर 10 सोलर स्ट्रीट लाइट की स्थापना एक गांव में की गई है, गरीब परिवार को प्रत्येक गांव में 300 सोलर लैंप वितरित किया गया है। शुद्ध पेयजल के लिए हैडपंप की चबूतरे की स्थापना और किसानों की सिंचाई के लिए पांच सोलर पंप की स्थापना की गई है, चार और प्रस्तावित है। किसानों को गेहूं व धान का उत्पादन बढ़ाने के लिए तथा कृषि लागत में कमी लाने के लिए तथा सिंचाई पर खर्च होने वाली पानी की मात्रा को कम करने हेतु श्री विधि तकनीक से जोड़कर जैविक खेती को बढ़ावा दिया जा रहा है प्रदेश सरकार की भी मंशा है कि जैविक खेती का उत्पादन किसानों से कराया जाए, क्योंकि रासायनिक उर्वरक की मात्रा ज्यादा होने से कई प्रकार के गंभीर रोगों का सामना लोगों को करना पड़ रहा। इसी को देखते हुए संस्था द्वारा लघु और सीमांत किसानों को कम कृषि लागत पर अधिक से अधिक उपज प्राप्त हो सके, इसके लिए दस गांवों में किसानों के लिए सौ वर्मी कंपोस्ट व सौ वर्मी वाश बनाने का कार्य किया गया है।
